

In big cities, you'll hear more English spoken. But when you are traveling through the hill towns of Tuscany, you'll need to do your best to speak Italian. Google Translate app is always a great thing to have handy while communicating. Here are some common phrases.

Basic phrases

Buongiorno (Bwohn johr noh)

Good Morning, said until 12pm.

Buona Sera (Bwoh-nah seh-rah)

Good evening, said after 12pm until dinner time.

Buona Giornata (Bwoh-nah johr-nah-tah)

Have a good day, can be said when leaving a store or a friend for lunch.

Buona Serata (Bwonah say ra tah)

Have a good evening, can be said after you leave someone after 4pm.

Salve (Sal-vey)

Hello or Goodbye (formal). When you are entering a store or leaving a store. You say this to strangers.

Ho bisogno di aiuto (oh bus-so-nio dee ah-ee-you-tow)

I need help, an important thing to know in case you get into trouble.

Dov' e' il/la ...??/Dov'è il bagno (doh-veh eel bah-ni-oh)

Where's the bathroom? Such an important phrase to know.

Il conto, per favore (eel cohn-toh, pehr fah-voh-reh)

The bill, please. When you are at a restaurant waiters wont come by every 2 seconds like in the states, you must wave them over to get the bill.

Posso pagare? (poh-soh pah-gah-reh)

Can I pay? This can be said in a store or a restaurant.

Un caffè, per favore. (unn ca-feh, pehr fah-voh-reh)

A coffee, please. Remember this means an espresso.

Due biglietti (doo-eh beel-yeht-tee) Un biglietto(oon beel-yeht-toh), per favore.

two tickets (one ticket), please. You can say this when you are buying bus tickets from a bar or at the train stations.

Prego (pray-go)

You're welcome, please go ahead, etc -

No, not the sauce. Prego is used in many ways, don't be surprised when you hear it.

Scusi (scoo-see)

Sorry/excuse me

Permesso (pear-mes-soh)

excuse me. You'll hear this when someone is trying to pass by you on the street, get off a bus, for example.
